

It's time to sit down, buckle-up and get ready for a ride! Regardless of what you drive, no matter if it's for business or personal use, the truth is, driving is serious business. Operating a motor vehicle is likely the <u>most</u> hazardous activity any of us perform each day, yet most of us receive little formal training on the topic after receiving our license. In this session we will investigate the current state and causal factors of automobile injuries, understand how operator equipment and behavior impact driver performance, and understand the physiological limitations of the human body though various activities. The goal of this session is to provide participants with practical strategies to systemically manage over the road exposures and prevent injuries whenever you are on the road.

EARLY UTILIZATION OF THERAPY LEADING TO REDUCED WORKER'S COMPENSATION

The majority of worker's compensation injuries involve musculoskeletal sprains and strains. Physical and occupational therapists are experts at understanding movement, biomechanics and how the body functions, and have the manual skills and treatment tools to help with pain control and restoring function, but yet, all too often, referrals to therapy are delayed. This is much evidence to show that earlier utilization of therapy can help alleviate fears for injured workers, treat acute pain, and restore movement health. In this session we will:

- 1. Review benefits of early utilization of physical and occupational therapy for musculoskeletal injury assessment, treatment and/or triage
- 2. Introduce Modern Pain Movement and Biopsychosocial model
- 3. Review research on spinal imaging
- 4. Compare outcomes with surgery and medicine vs. PT
- 5. Review research studies supporting early PT and OT
- 6. Explore effective utilization management to drive better RTW outcomes.
